Bookworm benefit

Friends of the Lena Armstrong Public Library hosting seventh annual Book and Author Luncheon this Saturday

It's time again for the Friends of the Lena Armstrong Public Library Book and Author Luncheon. This Saturday, the group will serve up a delightful program that will have bookworms wiggling in their chairs.

The seventh annual Book and Author Luncheon will be 11 a.m.-2 p.m. at the University of Mary Hardin-Baylor's Parker Academic Center. Reservation deadline was Monday, but President Judy Owens said there are a few spots left.

Featured authors this year are photographer and researcher LaShara J. Nieland with her book "Lone Star Wildflowers" (Texas Tech University Press), journalist and author Clay Coppedge with "Hill Country Chronicles" (History Press) and self-published author Tom Atwood with "Life is Good, God Bless Texas."

Owens said the luncheon always features Texas, if not local, authors.

Nieland's "Wildflowers" was co-authored by Willa F. Finley. The book is the culmination of 10 years of photography and research into the rich history of Texas' floral palette.

"I'm excited that people will be able to read the book and have more appreciation for the plants," Nieland said during a phone interview on Tuesday.

The book is organized first by color, then alphabetically by family name. "When we wrote it, we tried to make it user friendly. ... it's not your typical fielding guide" the Odessa-based author and photographer said.

Rather than capture just the array of beautiful flowers in Texas, Nieland and Finley both dug deep into the history of each plant to discover the true roots of these gorgeous plants. They also captured integral parts of the flowers such as stems and seed pods, not just the picturesque petals.



It took 10 years for Nieland and Finley to photograph and research the wide array of wildflowers found in Texas. The book contains information on history, mythology and the various uses for each flower.



Some of the history uncovered goes back to the original naming of the plants and any accompanying myths. Nieland and Finley also found out what medicinal and nutritional purposes the plants might have served for the pioneers and Native Americans. "We've seen this book awaken people to a real interest in wildflowers who had only a hint of interest before," Finley said in an e-mail on Wednesday.

After the luncheon, Nieland will be on hand at the Creekside Gallery in downtown Belton. Some of her photos will be on display and she will be available again for book signing.

"It's exciting to share the treasure Texas has in wildflowers ... each plant has had so many practical uses for thousands of years," said Nieland.

Coppedge is a former Telegram writer and has been promoting his book since last fall. "Hill Country Chronicles" is a collection of essays and columns about the rich history and quirky, fascinating tales from Central Texas. From the true story of Jim Bowie's knife to an oilman's search for Bigfoot, "Chronicles" is a rough and tumble gallop through history, legend and myth.

This year will be the first time

a self-published author is featured at the luncheon. Atwood's "Life is Good ..." is a personal collection of stories to his grandchildren. Since their birth, Atwood has been writing letters to his grandkids in hopes he could keep the family history alive. The tales stem from his origins in West Texas oil fields and cover everything from commentary on small-town Texas football to his work as a hospice social worker. In a press release for the book, Atwood's writing is described as a fusion of "wit and wisdom."

"Atwood's stories not only entertain, they inspire their readers to get busy about writing their own stories," the release said. Each letter is signed "Life is Good, God Bless Texas."

At the luncheon, copies of the author's books will be available for purchase.

There will also be a silent auction taking place during the luncheon. Board members from the Friends of the Lena Armstrong Public Library organized the auction by receiving donated items from area business as well as personally donating other auction items.

Owens said the auction typically brings in around \$1,500. The money will be used to help with the current remodeling project at the library. Funds will

go toward furnishings and computers.

Foilng tarnish

Dear Heloise: I read in a novel that you can polish silver flatware by bringing water containing aluminum foil to a boil. When boiling, place tarnished flatware in the water and add 1/4 cup baking soda. Boil for a few minutes. Remove the shiny silver, then wash in warm, soapy water and dry with a microfiber or other soft cloth.

By the way, make every day special by using your silver flatware. No need to save it for special occasions! — Heloise

of the foil, pour the boiling water carefully into the sink and mix to dissolve the baking soda.

Carefully put the silver pieces in, making sure they make contact with the foil. Soak for several minutes or until they are shiny, then rinse in cold water and dry with a microfiber or other soft cloth.

her on his door. I don't believe anything happened between them, but the neighbor apparently hoped something would.


